 community, helping kids navigate anxiety, isolation, and uncertainty reminding them they are
 never alone.





Michigan Delegation Report AAPA House of Delegates Meeting • Denver, CO • May 16-18, 2025

Overview

As Chief Delegate for the Michigan Academy of Physician Associates (MAPA), I had the privilege of leading an eight-member team through a highly productive three-day session in Denver. Our delegation arrived well prepared to advance Michigan's priorities and continue to push our profession forward. Over the course of the meeting, we engaged in governance elections, rigorous policy debate, and constructive collaboration with colleagues from all the other delegations.



Delegation Objectives and Preparation

In advance of the meeting, the Michigan delegation met to become oriented to the processes and procedures of the HOD along with a discussion of the proposed policies for this session. This allowed the delegates to discuss if there were any proposals that did not align with MAPAs core values. Each delegate brings their own experience and expertise to the discussion and made for a rich complement of PAs for the delegation.

Governance and Leadership Elections

The House re-affirmed its parliamentary charter and elected new House officers. Though Michigan did not field a candidate, we actively supported colleagues committed to enhancing procedural transparency and delegate engagement.

Major Policy Deliberations

Throughout the reference committee hearings, the delegation provided testimony and listened to discussions on many different topics. Some of the hot topics from this year included:

- Ethical Use of Artificial Intelligence: Al policy focused on ensuring fairness, transparency, and patient autonomy. A-08 to A-13 positions PAs as both innovators and stewards of equitable Al integration.
- Clinical Education and Preceptorship: There was continued discussion of the Supervised Clinical Practice Experience (SCPE) shortage. The Resolution 2025-B-13 amended a pre-existing policy paper to reaffirm the issue of SCPE shortage. The House adopted these measures, reinforcing cross-organizational collaboration among AAPA, PAEA, ARC-PA, and NCCPA.

- Doctoral Degrees and Academic Pathways: The House considered Resolutions 2025-A-14 and A-15 regarding mandatory PA doctorates and development of an entry-level doctoral pathway. Michigan's position maintained that the master's degree remain the current terminal credential while endorsing a collaborative study group to report on doctoral pathways by 2027. This balances the profession's historic commitment to the master's framework with a forward-looking exploration of diverse educational models that align with the rigor and complexity of our educational model.
- Public Health, Workplace Safety, and Advocacy: On professional and public health issues, Michigan supported passage of Resolution 2025-B-10 (Protecting PAs from Workplace Violence). Our delegation supported language emphasizing proactive security protocols, comprehensive deescalation training, and mandated peer-support time following traumatic incidents. We also endorsed harm-reduction strategies (C-15), expanded tuberculosis screening for high-risk populations (C-14), and mandatory seat-belt legislation (C-09), reflecting Michigan's long-standing commitment to community health and injury prevention.

Conclusions and Next Steps

The 2025 House of Delegates meeting yielded significant policy advancements:

- AAPA will pilot an AI bias-mitigation toolkit
- An inter-organizational task force will develop a playbook for doctoral-pathway reporting with key deliverables due by the 2027 HOD.
- AAPA and state chapters will partner on a national preceptor database and preceptordevelopment curriculum.

As we return to Michigan, our delegation is committed to educating our constituents regarding all the resolutions adopted. I am proud of the professionalism and passion displayed by our team. Together, we will continue to advance patient care, educational excellence, and the PA profession's leadership role throughout Michigan and beyond.

DEA TRAINING

Complete Your DEA Training Online







U.S. Congress-mandated training in the MATE (Medication Access & Training Expansion) Act is required before you renew your DEA license to prescribe controlled substances. This 8 hours of virtual training is now available from Michigan prescribers, discounted for MAPA Members at \$149, and other PAs for \$199. MAPA has partnered with the Michigan Osteopathic Association (MOA) and the Michigan Health & Hospital Association (MHA) to offer this training virtually to Michigan PAs. The training is required for PAs who have not graduated within the last 5 years or if the PA medicine program the PA attended within the last year did not provide the training. HERE are more details about the training exemption eligibility and other common questions.

MATE ACT Training to Fulfill DEA Application and Renewal Process (Meets 8 hours of training requirement) is offered by two of Michigan's most respected Osteopathic physicians.

Pam Lynch, LMSW, CAADC has a 25-year history working in addiction, and its comorbidities. As a trainer for the National Harm Reduction Coalition since 1999 Lynch has studied harm reduction programming in and outside of the U.S. extensively. Lynch is credited with starting harm reduction programs in Detroit, Ypsilanti, Traverse City, Kalkaska, Cadillac, Petoskey, and Midland, Michigan and Newark, N.J. Before taking leadership of Harm Reduction Michigan, she was employed by the county mental health authority in Traverse City.

LEGISLATIVE UPDATE

July-August Budget & Legislative Round-Up

This summer, the politically divided Michigan Legislature has been at a standstill with the state's budget for Fiscal Year (FY) 2025-2026.

In February, Governor Whitmer provided the legislature with her executive budget recommendation, which generally kick-starts the calendar year's budget process. In May, the Michigan Senate quickly unveiled their departmental budget bills, passing them out of their respective subcommittees and voting them off the Senate floor within the same day. Of the two proposals, the governor recommended a state budget totaling \$83.5 billion, and the Senate's budget totaled \$84.6 billion. However, as of the beginning of August, we have yet to see a House version of a completed budget.

The state budget process this fiscal year has been different than previous years for a myriad of reasons. First, January was chock full of conversations around impending paid sick leave and minimum wage laws, delaying budget progress. In addition to the delay, the Michigan House invoked new procedures to increase transparency throughout the appropriations process with a new system requiring individual legislators to put forth their specific requests and project details into a public system. The federal One Big Beautiful Bill resulted in over \$1 billion worth of funding cuts to the state of Michigan. Further, the Michigan House and Governor Whitmer have been walking intandem in search of a road funding deal in this year's budget. The Michigan Senate, however, has stated that a road funding deal cannot come at the expense of state programming that would likely fall victim to a road funding plan without a new revenue stream.

The most significant telltale sign for the poor negotiations between legislative chambers is the failure to pass a School Aid Fund (SAF) budget by the statutory deadline of July 1; a deadline Michigan has in place to provide schools with a "heads-up" on the amount of revenue they can expect to receive as they budget for their upcoming school year. After the Michigan House and Senate failed to reach an agreement on the SAF budget by the statutory deadline, there hasn't been movement between the two legislative chambers on any departmental budgets. In Michigan, the state has a constitutional deadline to pass a state budget by October 1st and without significant movement thus far, there's a looming possibility of a government shutdown.

For the first 7 months of the 103rd Legislature, there have only been 6 bills signed into law – the lowest number of bills signed into law at this point in a legislative cycle in the history of Michigan. With budget negotiations proceeding poorly, legislation that has successfully passed out of one chamber, including House Bill 4309 the Physicians Associates Compact Licensure bill, has been halted due to overarching political reason. Up until the third week of August, the Republican House was not moving bills sent from the Democratic-led Senate, and the Senate was following suit by not advancing Republican House bills. However, we recently saw movement on several House Republican

bills on the Senate floor. This is hopefully indicative of a thawing of political tensions and willingness to move bipartisan legislation that betters Michigan, our workforce, our families, and our economies.

As of July, MAPA has begun working with Midwest Strategy Group (MWSG) of Lansing to advance our legislative priorities. This partnership is spearheaded by our lobbying team at MWSG, Ramiro Galván and Leah Bolger, and MAPA President Michael White.



Ramiro Galván is widely respected for his expertise in the areas of health policy, appropriations, and insurance policy. He is also known for his skills in political fundraising, campaign finance law, and compliance.

Prior to joining Midwest Strategy Group, Ramiro served as Director of Legislative Affairs at the Michigan Department of Health & Human Services (MDHHS), where he was responsible for overseeing the legislative affairs division, constituent services, originating with members of the Michigan Legislature, and the development and advancement of MDHHS legislative and budget priorities in collaboration with stakeholders.

In addition to his work at MDHHS, Ramiro worked in the Michigan Legislature for several years as Legislative Director and Chief of Staff to the ranking member on the House and Senate Health Policy committees.



Leah Bolger is a dedicated public policy professional with extensive experience in legislative affairs, policy analysis, and coalition building. Before coming to Midwest Strategy Group, Leah was the Director of Legislative Affairs at the Michigan Chamber of Commerce, serving as an issue-area expert for over 5,000 member businesses, specializing in portfolios including tax, financial services, appropriations and economic development. She is skilled in collaborating with legislators, executive offices, and key stakeholders to shape impactful policy initiatives from conception to implementation.
